# Thursday 11th January 2024 January Japes Meal

# Thursday 8th February 2024 Food for the Gods

Chocolate is the title of this talk and Melanie King will talk about the history of chocolate from when it was first brought back from Mesoamerica where the Aztecs had used it in their rituals for human sacrifices. Since then, chocolate has been used as a murder weapon, in a plot against the British monarchy, as a hangover cure. Apparently, the English were at first distrustful of chocolate, thinking that drinking it hot would boil the blood however, the Italians enthusiastically embraced this new-fangled food creating weird and wonderful dishes. Melanie King is a British author and social historian who enjoys exploring the oddities of little-known byways of history. She lives at Woodstock and has given talks at The Blenheim Palace Literary Festival and around the country.

#### Thursday 14th March 2024

#### A Family's Journey in the Shadow of the Holocaust.

Our talks are usually informative, members learn something new or have the time to consider topics that are quite serious. This afternoon our speaker, Dr Vivien Sieber will give a talk entitled, Kino and Kinder: A Family's Journey in the Shadow of the Holocaust. This is the story of a European family's struggle to survive in the face of Nazi antisemitism and theHolocaust. Dr Sieber describes the terrible history of twentieth-century genocide through the lives and writings of the survivors. She has written a book, the title of the talk, which provides wonderful details about life in Vienna, Austria and Central Europe before World War Two and in post-war London. Dr Sieber worked in biosciences research at several Universities before retirement.

# Thursday 11th April 2024 Castles in the Air

This month we welcome to our meeting Nick Brazil who is a film maker, photographer and public speaker. He has chosen the intriguing title for his talk, Castles in the Air-The Story of Bizarre Early Inventions. A journey through the extraordinary world of early, mostly Victorian inventors with their bizarre ideas for improving the lot of their fellow human beings. Health was a major preoccupation with the Victorians with their suspicion that fresh air brought all sorts of illnesses so kept their homes hot and stuffy with their windows firmly closed. Nick has lived in many countries and promises to provide a new view of many previous discoveries.

# IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR RENEWING YOUR MEMBERSHIP 2024

For our u3a purposes, your renewal is due by 1st January and payment must be received before the end of January 2024 or your u3a membership will lapse at the end of January and you will not be eligible to attend General Meetings or to participate in any Interest Groups.

This year we will again be using our Beacon Administration system to do self-renewals. This proved a great success last year with over 300 members using it. This is a quick & streamlined process for you as well as saving the Membership Secretary a lot of work. You will be able to pay your renewal subscription either by credit/debit card or by using PayPal if you already have an account with them. After you have paid, your renewal will be automatically processed by the Beacon system and you will immediately receive an email with your membership card attached. We hope this will also appeal to people who currently don't do internet banking. You should have received an email in mid-November telling you how to setup your Portal account on our Beacon Administration system, and another email at the end of November inviting you to renew your membership.

If you do not have an email address, we will post you a form at the beginning of January which you can return with a cheque.

With regret, the membership fee needs to be increased for 2024 to £18 for Single membership and £36 for Joint membership. We have now run down our reserves to a level that is just about comfortable. In the meantime, it can hardly have escaped your notice that there has been a substantial amount of inflation. We have taken some measures to reduce costs and the committee feels that this level of subscription will just about cover our annual costs for the year ahead - but it will be reviewed in September 2024, by which time we will have a good idea whether that is so or not.

We are returning the subscription to about the level that it was some years ago but as there will be those who are not aware of the history, and in order to forestall some cries of anguish, here is the history and the reasoning for the committee's decision:

2018 : £18 or £30 couple

2019: £15 or £24 couple because it was felt we were carrying forward too much money

2020 : £15 or £24 couple still reducing reserves

2021 /2 /3 : £12 or £18 couple still reducing reserves AND reduced costs due to Covid

2024 : £18 per member.

We hope you feel that to have our subscription at almost the level of seven years ago is competent stewardship.

# Meeting – 14<sup>th</sup> September

### "Linking Tolkein to The Folly Tower"

Sjoerd Vogt

If you're a J.R.R. Tolkien fan then

you probably already know of the worldwide interest and research by millions of fans on the works of Tolkien – an extensive new study of the author's work reveals the likely sources of key scenes. Was the idea for Saruman's nightmarish Tower prompted by Faringdon Folly.

Our speaker today, Sjoerd Vogt, went further and indicated that our Folly Tower was the likely inspiration.

In 2014 Sjoerd met with Jack Fox, an 89 year old retired Estate Worker, who, as a child in 1934, recalls playing on the Folly Tower building site: he recalls the con-


struction as the most exciting time of their lives. There was a gentleman who the children called 'The Prof' who visited the Tower site regularly, he



sat on a log, smoking a pipe

with his sketching book Jack told Sjoerd. It seems 'The Prof' became quite obsessed with The Tower building and told the children the log was a sleeping dragon and he lit his pipe from the dragon's breath – is it likely 'The Prof' was Tolkien compiling ide-

as for The Lord of the Rings trilogy? FACT: In 1934 when Lord Berners planned to build his folly Jack recalls endless arguments between him and the town planners who objected to the build. There is compelling evidence that the Folly Tower is Tolkien's Saruman's



Tower in Lord of the Rings. In 2020 John Garth published 'The Worlds of J.R.R. Tolkien' which explores the real-life locations that inspired Middle-Earth's rich landscapes. Sjoerd displayed an Ordnance Survey Map showing the area around Buckland and Hatford and Tolkien's Middle-Earth map. FACT: There are amazing coincidental similarities between the two maps which cannot be ignored.

In the little village of Hatford in 1930 a little bothy was built and was named Rivendell. Sjoerd told us that Tolkien had a weekend bolthole in Hatford in 1934 and spent some time in the bothy. It cannot be such a coincidence that the author's valley of Middle-earth

in The Hobbit and The Lord of the Rings is named Rivendell. Years

later drawings were found on the walls of the bothy under the wallpaper which could have been made by Tolkien sketching out his ideas –sadly the drawings have been painted over and no record of them was kept.

As Tolkien stood in Hatford and looked out towards the Faringdon Folly Tower could he have imagined and created his image of Hobbiton Hill from this standpoint. What is interesting is that in 1938 Lord Berners designed the cover for the Wiltshire Shell country guide which is remarkably similar to Tolkien's Hobbiton Hill picture.



There are five Tolkien trails in the UK that are frequented by Tolkien fans – What are your thoughts about Faringdon becoming Tolkien Trail No. 6?

# Meeting - 12<sup>th</sup> October "The Great Stink"


We all need it at least once a day—our Loo! —we are the flush and forget society Dr. Tom Crook tells us.

Dr. Tom Crook is a lecturer at Oxford Brooks University in Modern History and his interesting talk was about our Victorian sewage system, which lately is receiving much publicity.

By 1900 all the key elements of our sewage system were in place—water closets, sewers but it was a very different picture in 1830.


Pre 1800 there were cesspits, chamber pots and the sewage system was little more than trenches draining into rivers. From 1780 there were brick built sewers but they also drained into rivers and if you lived in a City Centre and had money you might even have a water closet and piped water but that also drained directly into the rivers. We can see this was completely unstainable.

In 1801 we were 8,893,000 with 20% of us living in towns; 1831-3,877,000; 1851–17,928,000 with 54% living in towns; 1901-32,528,000 and by 1911 we were 36,070,000 with 80% of us living in towns. Consequently the rivers were highly pollut-



In 1842 a visionary, Edwin Chadwick developed a radical reform to the sewage question in an effort to 'heal the country'. However, the innovator be-

hind the concept was a man called Joseph Bazalgette. An official organisation was formed and named the




General Board of Health (GBH) which subsequently became the Institute of Civil Engineers.

Chadwick's concept was to bury small round pipes throughout the towns but these blocked and the subsequent design—an egg-shaped brick sewer was built.

By 1858 the London population had grown and in the summer of that year,

Parliament was closed because the River Thames was so polluted. The Metropolital Board of Works (the forerunner to the London County Council) was formed to deal with the problem. Joseph Bazalgette was apStreet towards Covent Garden. One of the two outfall systems into the Thames– Crossness Pumping House—still exists as a museum.



The complete infrastructure cost £4.2million and with some modifications still exists.

In 1860 the rain and household waste sys-

tems were combined and in 1871 the Local Government Board Reform Act was adopted which adopted Bazalgette's system locally.

Our own local Oxfordshire sewage system was designed and constructed from 1872 to 1880 by Robert Rawlinson, a prominent Civil Engineer of the day who was later knighted for his contribution.

The Northern working class towns followed on much later and it wasn't until the 1920/30's they were put on mains sewage systems.

Our water utility companies tell us their capital expenditure is £123.2billion per annum. However, £57billion was paid in dividends last year— we are left to wonder how much is being spent on necessary maintenance?

pointed Chief Engineer and he designed a scheme for London on a gigantic scale called London's Intercepting System. Simultaneously work had begun on the London Underground and so the two systems needed to be coordinated. Bazalgette spent 9 years digging up London to create 6 'interceptor' sewers, which were around 100 miles long altogether. Another 450 miles of sewer fed into them. Some of London's 'lost' rivers were used for the network. These included the river Fleet, running under Fleet



## **Meeting - 9<sup>th</sup> November**

## "A Day in the Life of a Magistrate"

Today we enjoyed a very interesting talk by Tony Hersch, a Magistrate sitting in Swindon, Aldershot and Basingstoke.

Tony explained that Magistrates (also known as Justices of the Peace) are volunteers from the community aged between 24 and 74. There is no requirement for any legal experience but certain criteria such as good character, understanding and communication, social awareness, maturity and sound temperament, sound judgement, commitment and reliability are welcome. Magistrates are expected to have personal integrity, enjoy the respect and trust of others, and be able to maintain confidences. Training is provided and you would be required to give the equivalent of 13 whole days annually.

Established over 650 years ago, the magistracy is a key part of the judiciary of England and Wales and it is a role underpinned by the principles of 'local justice' and 'justice by one's peers'. Magistrates typically sit as a bench of three, mixed in gender, age and ethnicity where possible to bring a broad experience of life to the bench. All members of the bench have equal deci-

sion-making powers,

There are presently 330 Magistrates Courts with over 12,000 magistrates; there are 92 Crown Courts; approximately 60% of magistrates are female with 13% of Asian, black and minority ethnic.

Magistrates preside over cases such as common assault, minor theft, criminal damage, public disorder and motoring offences. The maximum power of a magistrates is a six months' prison sentence. If magistrates decide a longer prison term is necessary for an offence or a repeat offender it is referred to a Crown Court; an unlimited fine can be given. There are guideline sentencing rules provided to magistrates which assist in awarding the appropriate punishment for a specific crime.

Tony showed four separate cases and asked us to decide on the punishments for the offenders. What would your punishment be for these cases? The Bench results can be found on the back page.

#### SHOPLIFTING

35 year old Female. On State Benefits. Alcohol-

ic. 170 previous convictions. Lots of Fines. Previous Rehabilitation. Previous Community Service. Current Crime: Stolen £55.00 worth of goods from Tesco.

#### **FRAUD**

50 year old Male. On State Benefits. No previous convictions.

Current Crime: Fake Police ID. Asked members of the public if he could inspect any £20 in their possession as could be fake. Would run off with note.

#### **ASSAULT**

65 Male of No Fixed Abode (NFA). Alcoholic. 65 previous convictions for shop lifting, 12 for burglary, 12 for drunk and disorderly. Previous fines. Community Service. Never been in prison.

Current Crime: Fell asleep in McDonalds and was approached by a waitress who woke him and asked him to leave. He held her against a wall; asked for sex and licked her face. Waitress suffered serious trauma as a result.

#### NO CAR INSURANCE

35 year old Male. Self employed electrician. Has children living with estranged wife. Has 6 points

for using mobile phone while driving.
Current Crime: Driving with No Car Insurance.
He thought that his domestic car insurance covered him for driving with third party cover in his business van.

If any offender pleads Not Guilty, the case is sent for trial at a future date; however if the offender has committed a serious repeat offence such as domestic assault should he/she be granted bail if there is a risk to the victim or should he/she be remanded in jail pending the future trial. The trial date could be 6 months; 9 months in the future – should a perpetrator, who could be innocent, now spend time in jail? This is a dilemma often facing a magistrate.

#### DOMESTIC ASSAULT

35 yearold male with one previous conviction of assaulting his girlfriend. Pleads Not Guilty at hearing.
What would your decision be?
Bail or Bail Denied?

**ASSAULT:** 3 Month Prison Sentence. Mandatory surcharge of £125.00. Prosecution Costs. **NO CAR INSURANCE:** Magistrates were 2 to 1. (One JP was mindful of the ban on driving which affected job/income and being able to visit children).
